

INTRODUCTION

Aspen's community outreach efforts in the Eastern Cape, more specifically in the New Brighton township and surrounding areas focuses on developing and sustaining communities in which we operate.

Aspen's Gqeberha facility has to date produced 160 million vaccine doses, majority of which have been received by African patients. This activity has resulted in the empowerment of employees from these areas and our ongoing community-focused programs have continued on this same trajectory.

We aim to, as far as possible provide each beneficiary of our partnerships, contributions and support with an indelible impact on their day to day lives.







The Dora Nginza Hospital situated in Zwide - a township not too far from Aspen's Gqeberha facility is a teaching hospital and forms part of the Gqeberha Hospital Complex. The facility has previously been embroiled in a number of media reports regarding the infant mortality rate due to lack of reliable equipment and resources. Infant deaths have skyrocketed since 2020 as crippling staff and equipment shortages are left unattended and mostly ignored.

Amidst these and other growing reports, the Clinton Health Access Initiative (CHAI) reached out to Aspen in a desperate effort to receive assistance for the hospital. Aspen responded by making a contribution to the hospital enabling them to refurbish the neonatal and paediatric ward as well as furnish it with new paediatric beds. The greatest achievement in this partnership is that their ultrasound machine received a much-needed upgrade which will in future assist the hospital in saving the lives of infants and save many new moms the trauma of losing a baby.

Ubuntu Pathways (formerly Ubuntu Education Fund) is a non-profit organization that provides an integrated support system of health, education, and social support in the townships of Gqeberha. Over the past 22 years, the Ubuntu Pathways Centre has transformed into a multi-discipline centre reminiscent of a village that has become an internationally recognized blueprint for community transformation. Ubuntu is built on the mantra of believing in trusting those closest to the problem to create the solution.

For this reason, Ubuntu and Aspen established a partnership at the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic, and at a time when South Africans who were suffering the most due to the economic impact of the virus to ensure that these individuals received the appropriate support. In partnership with the Aspen, Ubuntu delivered key equipment that healthcare and essential workers in the community desperately needed, from thermometers and surgical masks to hand sanitiser and gloves to 27 local clinics. They distributed over R5 million worth of equipment and supplies and launched a food security initiative, providing over 30,000 people life-saving medical, food security, and psychosocial support.

Heather Botha, Gqeberha, Eastern Cape









The Kolisi Foundation, Kwazakhele, Eastern Cape





The Kolisi Foundation was established in April 2020 by captain of Rugby World Cup winning Springboks Siya Kolisi and wife Rachel. The Foundation aims to change the trajectory of inequality in South Africa, by responding to the ongoing challenges faced by the most vulnerable of our country.

Aspen and the Kolisi Foundation partnered on an ongoing basis during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure that residents of the Kwazakhele township where the sportsman grew up. Through a partnership that lasted well over a year, we managed to respond to the increased levels of food insecurity in the area providing support to an average of families of 6 for a minimum of 3 months.
